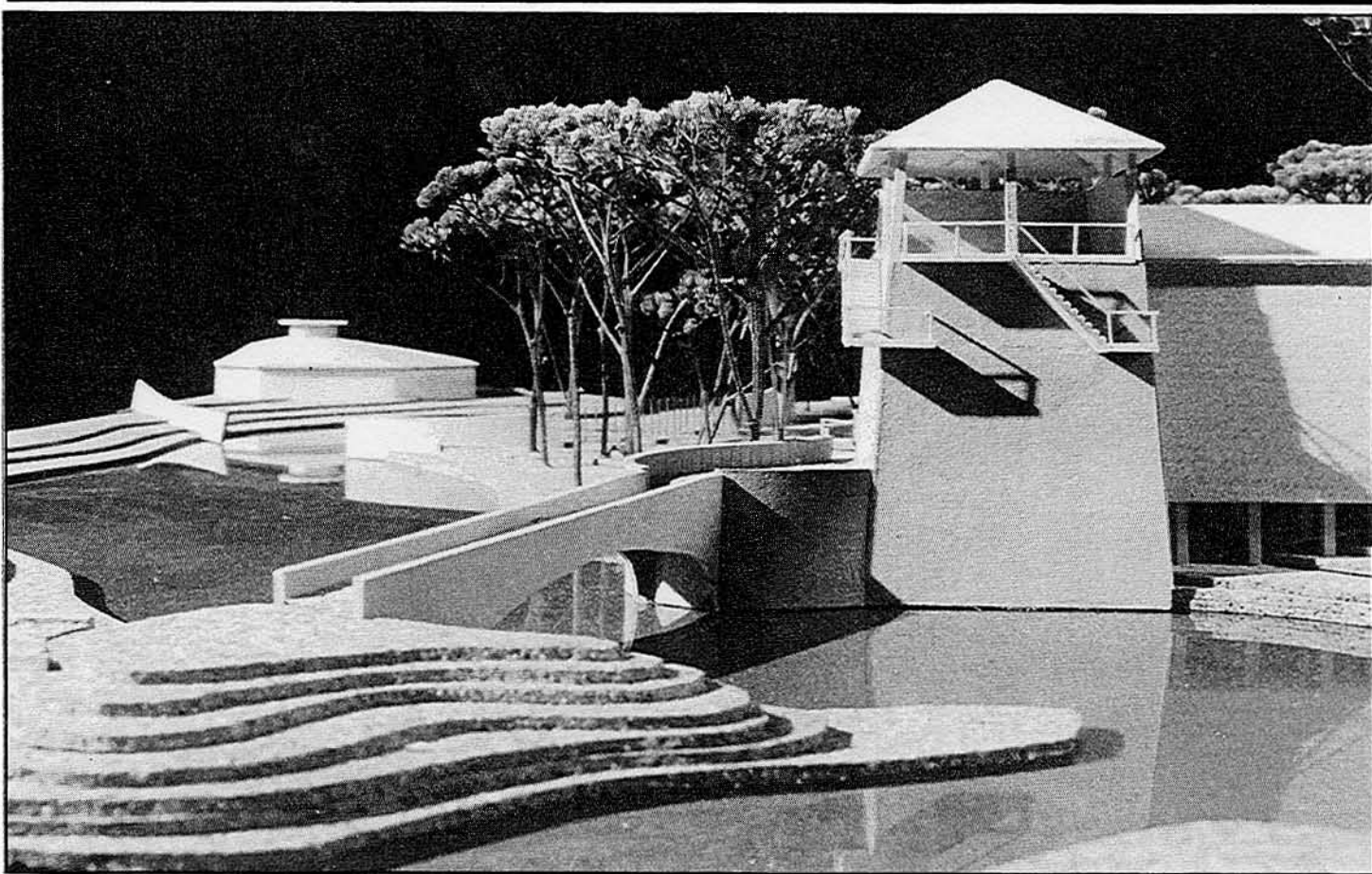

Women architect honored

Carrie Glassman Shoemake . . . is now being featured in an exhibit hosted by the Dallas Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

The exhibit, "Texas Pioneers," was inspired by a feature in the professional journal *Architecture*. The story centered on the three women, saying they have a "regionalist sensibility" in their approach to small-scale projects.

The exhibit portion for Shoemake, a Houston native, will include her plans for a

residential project — a modern house designed to fit into a historic neighborhood — and for an addition to the Fort Worth Zoo. The zoo project, done in conjunction with Hoover & Furr Architects, has a village/natural-setting theme to provide maximum comfort for animals and humans.

Shoemake, a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, won a 1991 design award from the Houston Chapter AIA for her first residential commission, the McCurdy House.
